Dear Parishioners and Friends of All Saints, Boyne Hill,

It is Monday 27 June as I write this copy of Parish News. If you are one of those people that pretends a deep interest in other people's holiday snaps this might not be for you especially as this is not in picture form but words!

I begin by sharing my brief talk at Burnham Abbey on this beautiful Monday morning as I proudly showed my stunningly beautiful gift of a rosary from Medjugorje, the curious Marian shrine which only in 2019 was given official recognition as a place of pilgrimage by the Vatican. Monika bought the gift for me on our visit to the place where six young people claimed to have seen and spoken with a beautiful young woman on the mountainside above the village, who later claimed to be the Virgin Mother. Whatever the truth of the apparitions, pilgrimage is now made a large scale. It is said one million people journey to Bosnia-Hercegovina to experience Medjugorje each year.

Thanks to Monika's friends, Jurek and Iwona, who drove us from Croatia to the border at Neum to make the crossing into Bosnia, both Monika and I can claim to have experienced not only Medjugorje but Mostar, a town that was bombed during conflict in 1992-95. Here the sixteenth-century Turkish bridge, blasted into oblivion has been rebuilt alongside the Old Town which has been declared a World Heritage site by UNESCO. Back to the talk this morning at Burnham. We commemorated the Bishop Cyril of Alexandria, who it is said 'when he contemplated Jesus he could see God, offering his presence to sinful humanity especially when he offered Christ's flesh and blood in the Eucharist.' (A History of Christianity by Diarmaid MacCulloch). Cyril was a follower of Athanasius who had fought hard for the equality of persons in the Trinity. However, 'a tactless priest' (MacCulloch's words) called Nestorius was chosen as Bishop of Constantinople. Nestorius attacked the belief that the Virgin Mary or Bearer of God 'Theotokos' as nonsense. 'The word of God is the creator of time, he is not created within time.' Mary was then bearer of a human not the son of God, claimed Nestorius. Cyril fought the battle and at the Council of Ephesus in 431 the title of 'Theotokos' or Mother of God, was affirmed.

Back to our experience of walking the mountainside above the village of Medjugorje. It was according to Monika's Fitbit 3000 steps up a steep climb over uneven rocks and stones in intense heat. When we arrived at the statue of Our Lady and the Crucifix we found hundreds of Polish, Albanian and Italian pilgrims praying. Some were on their knees in prayer at the feet of Mary, others venerating the cross of Jesus. There was total silence as people sat praying. Some pilgrims were elderly and struggling in the heat but determined to pray like Cyril. 'When he contemplated Jesus he could see God, offering His presence to sinful humanity.' As we descended the mountain, I became aware of a language I recognised. It was a group of Scottish pilgrims

being led by a young woman praying the rosary. I found myself joining in Hail Mary, Full of Grace...... as I carefully descended.

We travelled back to Croatia and the coastal town of Brela. This town of great beauty on the Adriatic coast offered not just blissful peace but religious belief. On arrival we enjoyed goulash on the recommendation of a local lorry driver. Before eating his portion of tender beef in sumptuous sauce he made the sign of the cross. We travelled to our apartment, overlooking the sea run by a family who provided hospitality to their guests. Everyday freshly baked cakes or drinks were offered. We were taken one morning to buy fresh mackerel and tuna steaks. Our host walking with the aid of a stick caused by a gunshot wound when in the army in the war of 92-95. That evening he cooked the fish on a outdoor BBQ.

A wonderful holiday that enabled us to experience too the faith of a people that experienced Jesus as their Saviour, the one who came to earth as a vulnerable baby boy to join the human with the divine.

Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, 'We have seen the Lord.' A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, 'Peace be with you.' Then he said to Thomas, 'Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe.' Thomas answered him, 'My Lord and my God!' EPISTLE Colossians 1: 1 - 14

Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, and Timothy our brother, To the saints and faithful brothers and sisters in Christ in Colossae: Grace to you and peace from God our Father. In our prayers for you we always thank God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, for we have heard of your faith in Christ Jesus and of the love that you have for all the saints, because of the hope laid up for you in heaven. You have heard of this hope before in the word of the truth, the gospel that has come to you. Just as it is bearing fruit and growing in the whole world, so it has been bearing fruit among yourselves from the day you heard it and truly comprehended the grace of God. This you learned from Epaphras, our beloved fellow-servant. He is a faithful minister of Christ on your behalf, and he has made known to us your love in the Spirit. GOSPEL Luke 10: 25 - 37

A lawyer stood up to test Jesus. 'Teacher,' he said, 'what must I do to inherit eternal life?' He said to him, 'What is written in the law? What do you read there?' He answered, 'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbour as yourself.' And he said to him, 'You have given the right answer; do this, and you will live.' But wanting to justify himself, he asked Jesus, 'And who is my neighbour?' Jesus replied, 'A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell into the hands of robbers, who stripped him, beat him, and went away, leaving him half dead. Now by chance a priest was going down that road; and when he saw him, he passed by on the other side. So likewise a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan while travelling came near him; and when he saw him, he was moved with pity. He went to him and bandaged his wounds, having poured oil and wine on them. Then he put him on his own animal, brought him to an inn, and took care of him. The next day he took out two denarii, gave them to the innkeeper, and said, "Take care of him; and when I come back, I will repay you whatever more you spend." Which of these three, do you think, was a neighbour to the man who fell into the hands of the robbers?' He said, 'The one who showed him mercy.' Jesus said to him, 'Go and do likewise.'
