Dear Parishioners and Friends of All Saints, Boyne Hill,



This weekend sees both Armistice Day on 11th November, and Remembrance Sunday the following day. On these occasions we remember and give thanks for those who gave their lives in the cause of peace, justice and freedom from oppression. As we give thanks for the freedom that we enjoy because of their sacrifice, this gives us a sense of responsibility to use that freedom well, both as the best memorial we can make to their sacrifice (after all, our freedom is their gift to us, bought at great cost), and as the best way of avoiding the need for such sacrifice in the future.

Care for our loved ones.

This season of remembrance, with All Souls last weekend and Remembrance Sunday this coming Sunday, also reminds us of our own mortality. We none of us know when our life in this world will come to an end, and "in the midst of life we are in death" (Job 14:1). So it is the responsible thing to prepare well for our death, not least as an act of care and compassion towards our loved ones who will, whilst still grieving, need to look after our affairs. So ensuring the information they will need can be readily found, however securely it must be kept in the meantime, and that all financial affairs in order and up to date is a great help — Where are all our savings accounts? What is the address of that great friend who would love to be at the funeral? Who has the Will? It also really helps our loved ones if they know what your wishes are for the funeral or memorial service. By selecting appropriate hymns and readings that mean so much to you, you can make the funeral service both a fitting tribute to the faith that has enriched your life, and a witness to others of the love of God which you have experienced.

Experience of talking with bereaved families shows how much help this can be – and having a conversation as a family about what our wishes might be turns out not to be a dreary, mournful conversation, but is usually an opportunity for celebration together of life, gratitude and faith as you talk together about the things that mean the most to you.

Having an up-to-date Will is essential, and it might need to cover things such as who you want to look after young children if anything happens to you. Remember that if you have recently married, any Will made prior

to your marriage might now be invalid as a matter of law. Consulting a solicitor is advised in all matters concerning your Will. Thinking carefully about how you want your Estate dealt with, and who might be beneficiaries, is an act of Christian Stewardship in just the same way as thinking about our charitable giving during our lifetime.

And have you thought of making a tax-free bequest to All Saints Church in your Will? It is possible to specify that such a gift should be used for a specific purpose, such as maintenance of the building, or work with schools and families in the Parish – or it can be for use at the discretion of the PCC. In this way, you can support the mission and ministry of the Church, and promote the Christian message of faith, hope and love into the future. If you do, you will be following in a long line of those who have been benefactors, contributing to the maintenance of Christian worship and loving service at All Saints for 160+ years.

If you would like further information on how to do this, please talk to me in the first instance. And it's wise to talk to me if you are considering restricting the use to which any gift might be put to – if it is too restrictive, the PCC may have difficulties making use of the gift in accordance with your wishes.

Almighty God, from whom all thoughts of truth and peace proceed: kindle, we pray, in the hearts of all, the true love of peace; and guide with your pure and peaceable wisdom those who take counsel for the nations of the earth; that in tranquillity your kingdom may go forward, till the earth is filled with the knowledge of your love, through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord. Amen.

EPISTLE: 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18

We do not want you to be uninformed, brothers and sisters, about those who have died, so that you may not grieve as others do who have no hope. For since we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so, through Jesus, God will bring with him those who have died. For this we declare to you by the word of the Lord, that we who are alive, who are left until the coming of the Lord, will by no means precede those who have died. For the Lord himself, with a cry of command, with the archangel's call and with the sound of God's trumpet, will descend from heaven, and the dead in Christ will rise first. Then we who are alive, who are left, will be caught up in the clouds together with them to meet the Lord in the air; and so we will be with the Lord for ever. Therefore encourage one another with these words.

GOSPEL Matthew 25: 1 – 13

Jesus spoke this parable to the disciples: 'The kingdom of heaven will be like this. Ten bridesmaids took their lamps and went to meet the bridegroom. Five of them were foolish, and five were wise. When the foolish took their lamps, they took no oil with them; but the wise took flasks of oil with their lamps. As the bridegroom was delayed, all of them became drowsy and slept. But at midnight there was a shout, "Look! Here is the bridegroom! Come out to meet him." Then all those bridesmaids got up and trimmed their lamps. The foolish said to the wise, "Give us some of your oil, for our lamps are going out." But the wise replied, "No! there will not be enough for you and for us; you had better go to the dealers and buy some for yourselves." And while they went to buy it, the bridegroom came, and those who were ready went with him into the wedding banquet; and the door was shut. Later the other bridesmaids came also, saying, "Lord, lord, open to us." But he replied, "Truly I tell you, I do not know you." Keep awake therefore, for you know neither the day nor the hour.'
