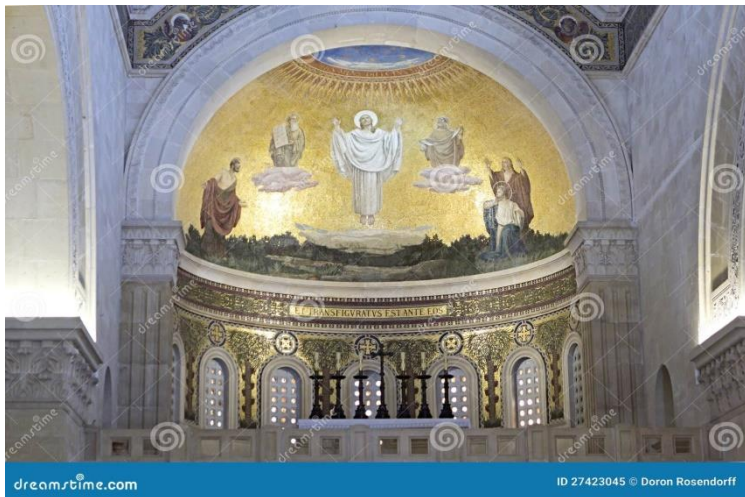

Dear Parishioners and Friends of All Saints, Boyne Hill,



Glory and Beauty

If you had to pick a selection of stories or events from the Gospels, I wonder which they would be? Christmas, Good Friday and Easter certainly, as key moments in the life of Jesus. Perhaps Pentecost, or maybe one of the healing miracles of Jesus. Perhaps his teaching in the Sermon on the Mount.

This Sunday we focus on another of those key moments in the Gospels, as we celebrate the Feast of the Transfiguration. In this event, Jesus during his earthly life appeared to his closest disciples

transfigured in glory. You can find the story of the Transfiguration of Jesus in the Sunday Readings on p4 of this edition of Parish News.

When we focus on these key moments in the life of Jesus, we see an important event in the work of God as he works to bring us hope and forgiveness. But through them we also see something of who God is, and who we are. At Christmas, for instance, we see through the historic event to the nature of God – his humility, and his love for us in coming into this imperfect and sometimes brutal world in order to share his love and his life with us. And we see in the newborn infant something of the purity, beauty and potential of each and every human being.

The Transfiguration is a showing of divine glory and beauty, and its celebration is a feast and a 'showing forth' of that divine glory and beauty. But Jesus on the mountain top doesn't just reveal the beauty and glory of God – he also reveals the beauty and glory of our humanity as it was made to be, and as God intends it to be at some point in the future. On the Feast of the Transfiguration, I'm told, in the Byzantine Liturgy Christians sing of how Christ 'transfigured disfigured humanity' and 'in his own person showed the apostles the true nature of humanity'. This tells of our human dignity and worth in the sight of God. As Christians we have a realistic view of human nature, we know acknowledge that we live in a fallen world, and that there are limits to our potential for good because of the corruption of our human nature. But we also tell of God's great rescue-story for humanity, his plan for our redemption and life with God and each other in a place where there shall be no more weeping or crying or pain (Revelation 21:4).

I very much value the traditional form of prayer known as the Rosary, because it gives us twenty different scenes from the life of Jesus and his mother Mary to meditate upon, and in so doing we focus on individual events such as the Transfiguration. As we do so, we not only reflect on the event recorded by the passage of scripture, but more importantly we take into our hearts and minds something of the glory and beauty of God, and something of our own potential as a child of God. Traditionally we would repeat the Hail Mary ten times as we think prayerfully about each scene, but you don't have to use the Hail Mary at all – you can repeat another prayer such as “Lord Jesus, have mercy upon me”, or you can sit in silence and contemplate one of these scenes.

I thoroughly commend to you this way of praying as part of your routine of prayer. It is especially valuable as a way of praying when you can't manage words at all, when even the Lord's Prayer seems empty and meaningless – those times of confusion or worry or pain when words just don't seem to work. Then, staying quietly with a scene from the Rosary, perhaps using a repeated word or phrase to anchor the 'thinking' part of the brain, is a wonderful - indeed the only - way of praying that works for me in those times. But it is not just valuable at those times – it can be an anchor-point in your weekly routine of prayer.

And, of course, it keeps you anchored in the key moments and scenes of the Gospels so they become a part of you, deep within.

If you would like to try this way of prayer, this is the list of biblical events that make up the Rosary way of praying. The events are grouped into four sets of five scenes, and you can meditate on one scene by itself, or more than one, or use a complete set of five scenes in your prayer time:

The Annunciation (Luke 1: 26-38)

The Visitation of Mary to Elizabeth (Luke 1: 39-56)

The Birth of Jesus at Bethlehem (Luke 2: 4-20)

The Presentation of Christ in the Temple in Jerusalem (Luke 2: 22-35)

The finding of the child Jesus in the Temple (Luke 2: 41-52)

The Baptism of Jesus (Matthew 3: 13-17)

The Wedding at Cana (John 2: 1-11)

The Proclamation of the Kingdom (Matthew 5: 1-16; 13: 1-52)

The Transfiguration (Luke 9: 28-36)

The Last Supper and Institution of the Eucharist (Luke 22: 14-20)

The Agony in the Garden (Luke 22: 39-47)

The Scouring of Jesus (Mark 15: 1-15)

The Crowning with thorns (Matthew 27: 27-31)

The carrying of the Cross (John 19: 16-17)

The Crucifixion (Luke 23: 33-38; 44-46)

The Resurrection (John 20: 1-10)

The Ascension (Acts 1: 6-14)

The Descent of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost (Acts 2: 1-12)

The Assumption of Mary (1 Thessalonians 4: 13-18)

The Glory of the Saints in Heaven (Revelation 21: 1-4)

WORSHIP FOR SUNDAY 6 AUGUST THE FEAST OF THE TRANSFIGURATION OF OUR LORD

COLLECT

Father in heaven, whose Son Jesus Christ was wonderfully transfigured before chosen witnesses upon the holy mountain, and spoke of the exodus he would accomplish at Jerusalem: give us strength to hear his voice and bear our cross that in the world to come we may see him as he is; who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

EPISTLE 2 Peter 1: 16 -18

We did not follow cleverly devised myths when we made known to you the power and coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, but we had been eyewitnesses of his majesty. For he received honour and glory from God the Father when that voice was conveyed to him by the Majestic Glory, saying, 'This is my Son, my Beloved, with whom I am well pleased.' We ourselves heard this voice come from heaven, while we were with him on the holy mountain. So we have the prophetic message more fully confirmed. You will do well to be attentive to this as to a lamp shining in a dark place, until the day dawns and the morning star rises in your hearts.

GOSPEL Luke 9: 26 – 36

Jesus took with him Peter and John and James, and went up on the mountain to pray. And while he was praying, the appearance of his face changed, and his clothes became dazzling white. Suddenly they saw two men, Moses and Elijah, talking to him. They appeared in glory and were speaking of his departure, which he was about to accomplish at Jerusalem. Now Peter and his companions were weighed down with sleep; but since they had stayed awake, they saw his glory and the two men who stood with him. Just as they were leaving him, Peter said to Jesus, 'Master, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah.' Peter did not know what he said. While he was saying this, a cloud came and overshadowed them; and they were terrified as they entered the cloud. Then from the cloud came a voice that said, 'This is my Son, my Chosen; listen to him!' When the voice had spoken, Jesus was found alone. And they kept silent and in those days told no one any of the things they had seen.

for you to look around your church at leisure, to learn things you never knew and to ask those questions you always wanted to.

You can look at the font and pulpit by Thomas Earp, the beautiful stained-glass windows by John Hardman and William Wailes, as well as a 20th century window by the famous 20th century glass designer Sir Ninian Comper, the elaborate choir stall carvings, the mediaeval style wall stencilling and the floor brasses. And don't forget to ask about Inspector Morse!
