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Dear Friends and Parishioners of All Saints, Boyne Hill,

During August I have been taking time to walk with my schoolfriend John on Mondays to begin preparation for our pilgrimage along the North Wales coastline next July. The first walk that John had prepared was the most challenging we have taken this summer, starting at Watlington and journeying part of the Ridgeway ending at Princes Risborough. It was a beautiful walk but in very hot weather. The drought much of Europe is facing at the time of writing was clearly in evidence as we walked the farmers' fields. Many of the fields were similar to broken pieces of concrete. Clear evidence if any was needed of the challenges faced by farmers in trying to maintain a living, the food chain and protecting their animals. Many of the sheep were found protected under trees trying to keep cool. We have heard I am sure that farmers are using winter feed for their stock to keep them alive but if we have too many summers such as this one we are experiencing the challenges of maintaining the food chain will increase.

On 1 September Christians will begin Creationtide. Christians use this time to give thanks for the earth, celebrate God as the creator and focus on environmental care and sustainability. This festival was started in 1989 by the Eastern Orthodox Church. The theme for the Church of England in 2026 is 'Living Water' based on Ezekiel 47.1-12 which highlights God's living water flowing from the temple of God, growing deeper restoring barren land, reviving waters and sustaining flourishing ecosystems. Humanity is challenged to embrace interconnectedness with the environment.

For the last five years or so All Saints has made the effort to give thought and planning to the way we as a church follow Creationtide. We will begin in late August and early September as Fr David and Fr Chris give their thoughts in the sermons. On the 20 September I will preach on Fairtrade and use the gospel of Matthew (Pope Francis' favourite Saint) to reflect on Fairtrade. Many poor farmers across the world had been forced into desperate acts like deforestation to survive. Fairtrade has sought to help people seek sustainable farming techniques through helping people financially. At All Saints we have for the last few years supported sustainable farming in Africa enabling women to learn farming skills, sharing those techniques of sustainable farming with others and making profits from the crops grown to fund education for their children through the Ripple Effect Charity. Try this Creationtide to seek out those Fairtrade bananas, sugar, tea, wine, vegetables, fruit juices, coffee, flowers and of course chocolate.

On the 27 September our Sundays @4 team will provide an afternoon all age service to mark St Francis of Assisi. Francis had a desire to love God and neighbour and had a deep love for animals and creation. People will be invited to bring their pets.

On the 4 October we will celebrate Harvest Festival at our 10am Family Eucharist. We once again are delighted to welcome students from Boyne Hill, All Saints and Altwood Church of England schools to celebrate Harvest with us. Following the service, we will hold our harvest auction which normally leads to some fun and generous fund raising. Please bring harvest goods for auction and all the funds will go to the schools for use on their sustainable projects.

Throughout September there will be school assemblies that I will be invited to join. At Boyne Hill and All Saints Schools there will be the blessing of food, short stories and prayers. At All Saints the theme is compassion as they reach out locally through FoodShare.

On Thursday 24 September at All Saints School from 6.45pm our Sustainability Team has planned a showing of the People's Emergency Briefing. This evening will be open to our congregation and to the other world faith represented by WAMCF (Windsor and Maidenhead Community Forum) . The People's Emergency Briefing aims at enhancing public awareness of climate and environmental risks. A series of community led screenings have been shown this year. A number of us visited Norden Farm earlier in the year alongside about 100 other people from Maidenhead who are concerned about the climate and biodiversity crisis. The film itself features experts highlighting risks to health, food systems, national security, and the economy. It shows the seriousness of the situation and opportunities for positive action. The viewer is asked to contact their local MP to advocate urgent government action. Well-known people like Chris Packham, Jennifer Saunders and Deborah Meaden all contribute to the film. There is also a poster attached to the e-mail.

Finally, I have been reading on BBC news about El Nino which is not thought to be impacted by human induced behavior but nevertheless impacts the quality of our lives alongside global warming. In the United Kingdom El Nino may bring dramatic storms and flooding this Autumn and lead to the hottest summer on record in 2027. Globally the UN's Food and Agricultural Organization have warned that El Nino could threaten food security in many parts of the world.

As a church community we are doing what we can to play our part as responsible people focusing on environmental care and sustainability. Clearly Creationtide is not just for those folk who are interested in this subject but for all of us.

ADVANCE NOTICE

Parish visit to St Albans Cathedral on Sunday, 20th September 2026

After several successful recent parish visits, including to Keble College and Worcester College in Oxford, we would like to offer members of the congregation an opportunity to visit St Albans Cathedral in Hertfordshire. The cathedral is the oldest site of continuous Christian worship in Britain and an important place of pilgrimage, as well as of worship. St Albans Cathedral has the longest nave in England at 85 meters, an 11th century Norman crossing tower which is the country's only cathedral tower built with Roman bricks, and a rare collection of medieval wall paintings.

The cathedral is about 25 miles from Maidenhead. Our plan is to leave All Saints by bus at 12.30pm in order to arrive in good time for a private tour of the cathedral at 1.45pm. The tour will last about an hour and 15 minutes. There will be an opportunity afterwards to have tea in the cathedral café, or explore the building further. We would then attend evensong at 4pm, and expect to return to Maidenhead for about 6pm.

The cathedral charges a fee for group tours, starting at £10 per head. We anticipate the cost of the minibus will be around £15 per person. Therefore, we expect the cost of the outing to be around £25 per person, depending on interest. Please note that this will not include any refreshments from the cathedral café.

WORSHIP FOR SUNDAY 30 AUGUST THE THIRTEENTH SUNDAY AFTER TRINITY

COLLECT

Almighty God, who called your Church to bear witness that you were in Christ reconciling the world to yourself: help us to proclaim the good news of your love, that all who hear it may be drawn to you; through him who was lifted up on the cross, and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

READING : Romans 12: 9 - 21

Let love be genuine; hate what is evil, hold fast to what is good; love one another with mutual affection; outdo one another in showing honour. Do not lag in zeal, be ardent in spirit, serve the Lord. Rejoice in hope, be patient in suffering, persevere in prayer. Contribute to the needs of the saints; extend hospitality to strangers. Bless those who persecute you; bless and do not curse them. Rejoice with those who rejoice, weep with those who weep. Live in harmony with one another; do not be haughty, but associate with the lowly; do not claim to be wiser than you are.

Do not repay anyone evil for evil, but take thought for what is noble in the sight of all. If it is possible, so far as it depends on you, live peaceably with all. Beloved, never avenge yourselves, but leave room for the wrath of God; for it is written, 'Vengeance is mine, I will repay, says the Lord.' Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good.

GOSPEL: Matthew 16: 21 - 28

From that time on, Jesus began to show his disciples that he must go to Jerusalem and undergo great suffering at the hands of the elders and chief priests and scribes, and be killed, and on the third day be raised. And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him, saying, 'God forbid it, Lord! This must never happen to you.' But he turned and said to Peter, 'Get behind me, Satan! You are a stumbling-block to me; for you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things.' Then Jesus told his disciples, 'If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake will find it. For what will it profit them if they gain the whole world but forfeit their life? Or what will they give in return for their life? For the Son of Man is to come with his angels in the glory of his Father, and then he will repay everyone for what has been done. Truly I tell you, there are some standing here who will not taste death before they see the Son of Man coming in his kingdom.'

WORSHIP FOR SUNDAY 6 SEPTEMBER THE BEGINNING OF CREATIONTIDE COLLECT

Almighty God, whose only Son has opened for us a new and living way into your presence: give us pure hearts and steadfast wills to worship you in spirit and in truth; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. **Amen**

READING: Romans 13: 8 - 14

Owe no one anything, except to love one another; for the one who loves another has fulfilled the law. The commandments, 'You shall not commit adultery; You shall not murder; You shall not steal; You shall not covet'; and any other commandment, are summed up in this word, 'Love your neighbour as yourself.' Love does no wrong to a neighbour; therefore, love is the fulfilling of the law. Besides this, you know what time it is, how it is now the moment for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we became believers; the night is far gone, the day is near. Let us then lay aside the works of darkness and put on the armour of light; let us live honourably as in the day, not in revelling and drunkenness, not in debauchery and licentiousness, not in quarrelling and jealousy. Instead, put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires.

GOSPEL: Matthew 18: 15-20

Jesus spoke to his disciples. 'If another member of the church sins against you, go and point out the fault when the two of you are alone. If the member listens to you, you have regained that one. But if you are not listened to, take one or two others along with you, so that every word may be confirmed by the evidence of two or three witnesses. If the member refuses to listen to them, tell it to the church; and if the offender refuses to listen even to the church, let such a one be to you as a Gentile and a tax-collector. Truly I tell you, whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven. Again, truly I tell you, if two of you agree on earth about anything you ask, it will be done for you by my Father in heaven. For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them.'

WORSHIP FOR SUNDAY 13 SEPTEMBER THE FIFTEENTH SUNDAY AFTER TRINITY

COLLECT

God, who in generous mercy sent the Holy Spirit upon your Church in the burning fire of your love: grant that your people may be fervent in the fellowship of the gospel that, always abiding in you, they may be found steadfast in faith and active in service; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen

READING : Romans 14: 1 - 12

Welcome those who are weak in faith, but not for the purpose of quarrelling over opinions. Some believe in eating anything, while the weak eat only vegetables. Those who eat must not despise those who abstain, and those who abstain must not pass judgement on those who eat; for God has welcomed them. Who are you to pass judgement on servants of another? It is before their own lord that they stand or fall. And they will be upheld, for the Lord is able to make them stand. Some judge one day to be better than another, while others judge all days to be alike. Let all be fully convinced in their own minds. Those who observe the day, observe it in honour of the Lord. Also those who eat, eat in honour of the Lord, since they give thanks to God; while those who abstain, abstain in honour of the Lord and give thanks to God. We do not live to ourselves, and we do not die to ourselves. If we live, we live to the Lord, and if we die, we die to the Lord; so then, whether we live or whether we die, we are the Lord's. For to this end Christ died and lived again, so that he might be Lord of both the dead and the living. Why do you pass judgement on your brother or sister? Or you, why do you despise your brother or sister? For we will all stand before the judgement seat of God. For it is written, 'As I live, says the Lord, every knee shall bow to me, and every tongue shall give praise to God.' So then, each of us will be accountable to God.

GOSPEL: Matthew 18: 21 - 35

Peter came and said to Jesus, 'Lord, if another member of the church sins against me, how often should I forgive? As many as seven times?' Jesus said to him, 'Not seven times, but, I tell you, seventy-seven times. For this reason the kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who wished to settle accounts with his slaves. When he began the reckoning, one who owed him ten thousand talents was brought to him; and, as he could not pay, his lord ordered him to be sold, together with his wife and children and all his possessions, and payment to be made. So the slave fell on his knees before him, saying, "Have patience with me, and I will pay you everything." And out of pity for him, the lord of that slave released him and forgave him the debt. But that same slave, as he went out, came upon one of his fellow-slaves who owed him a hundred denarii; and seizing him by the throat, he said, "Pay what you owe." Then his fellow-slave fell down and pleaded with him, "Have patience with me, and I will pay you." But he refused; then he went and threw him into prison until he would pay the debt. When his fellow-slaves saw what had happened, they were greatly distressed, and they went and reported to their lord all that had taken place. Then his lord summoned him and said to him, "You wicked slave! I forgave you all that debt because you pleaded with me. Should you not have had mercy on your fellow-slave, as I had mercy on you?" And in anger his lord handed him over to be tortured until he would pay his entire debt. So my heavenly Father will also do to every one of you, if you do not forgive your brother or sister from your heart.'

DOING THE SMALL THINGS WELL

The theme for this year's Season of Creation is 'Living Water'. This hot and dry summer has made us all think about water. Here are a few tips for saving water:

- Take a shower rather than a bath – and keep your shower to three to five minutes. Here's a Spotify playlist of [four-minute shower songs](#) from WaterAid for you to play while you shower!
- Catch water rather than let it drain. For example, when rinsing vegetables (using a jug or basin) or in the shower. When on holiday in Namibia a few years ago, there was a bucket in the shower to do just this! The water can be used to flush the toilet or on the garden.
- Waste water from washing up or having a bath can be used in the garden (although not on anything you'll eat.)
- Install a water butt, if you have space. Most store about 200l of water. You can capture quite a lot of water even if there is only a small amount of rain.
- Fit a toilet saving device to your toilet cistern. Toilet flushing counts for about 30% of household water. You can get devices like a 'Hippo' from www.hippo-the-watersaver.co.uk or you could put a brick in the cistern.
