Dear Friends and Parishioners of All Saints, Boyne Hill,

As many of you will know Monika treated me to a wonderful 60th birthday trip to Amsterdam in February just past. For those of you that know this city it is renowned for its beautiful streets, buildings and canals as well as for housing some of the great art galleries of Europe. We visited the Rijks museum, Rembrandt's House and the Van Gogh Museum.

The highlight for me was the three hours we spent enjoying the art on display at the Van Gogh Museum. It was fascinating to listen to the commentary explore not only some of the selected paintings but how the story of Van Gogh's life and thinking came through his works. The life of Van Gogh is a tragic one in terms of his mental health and ultimate early death. However, his work in particular the burst of colour found in his 'Sunflowers' paintings are according to the author and journalist Martin Gayfield (Whose book on the Sunflowers I recently purchased) writes 'In the twenty-first century, no work in this collection of great masterpieces is more loved and admired than Van Gogh's glorious 'Sunflowers'. (The National Gallery)

As some of you will know from a recent sermon, I shared I was introduced to Van Gogh by a ten-year-old boy who was seen as a bully at Garnlydan school in Beaufort, Ebbw Vale. When I left the South Wales valleys in 1998 to move to Bracknell I was presented with the young boy's gift to me of his painting of the Sunflowers. I mislaid the picture for a number of years until clearing out the vicarage attic last summer and the painting came floating down from the open attic hatch.

During Lent on Wednesday evenings, I have chosen to show five films that ask us important questions of life. 'The Old Oak' that tells the story of Syrian asylum seekers arriving in a town in the North of England who at first do not receive a warm welcome from the locals. We will watch an entertaining but ultimately sad film that asks the question around end-of-life issues called 'Me Before You' adapted from the novel of Jo Jo Moyes. We will explore again through a refugee the ability of humanity to be creative and offer hospitality through 'Babette's Feast' and then contemplate the Law v. grace of 'Les Misérables'. The film we start with which Jan and Mike Moss are kindly hosting is 'Loving Vincent' which tells the story of a postman asking his son Armand to deliver Van Gogh's final letter to his now late brother Theo. Armand becomes fascinated with the fete of Van Gogh and the details surrounding his death. The film is a beautiful, animated story using 1000s of paintings designed in the way of Van Gogh.

The 200th anniversary of the National Gallery and the book VAN GOGH SUNFLOWERS by Martin Gayfield focus largely on the time the artist spent in the South of France and his joy for light and colour. He painted Sunflowers of intense colour highlighting resurrection and dying sunflowers of crucifixion. The brief life of the vibrancy of the sunflower, Martin Gayfield writes 'In the National Gallery's Sunflowers Van Gogh created an image of his own vitality, love of beauty and of the poignant brevity of passing time.'

As Monika and I explored the Van Gogh Museum in Amsterdam it was the artists 'Wheatfields' that also caught the eye. These were a product of his religious studies, the connection to nature, appreciation of

manual labour (the ordinary peasant life) and a desire to offer comfort to others. Van Gogh was entranced by the biblical parables and the wheatfields are metaphors of humanities cycles of life. As a child he recalled the parable of the Sower and Van Gogh used the ploughman and the digger as a symbol of the struggle to reach the Kingdom of God. In one of his paintings, we see the reaper (death) and the wheat (humanity) as we see the brevity of life but also the bright sunshine of resurrection. He painted a large number of his works at this point from behind the bars of his Asylum hospital and yet still somewhere inside of him he painted paintings of hope.

In the sermon I mentioned preached on my return from Amsterdam I was presented with the Beatitudes from St Luke. Luke focuses on the poor and marginalised and a view of the kingdom. The poor may not have stored up riches but shared them, the hungry are seeking a deep relationship with God and the people that weep perhaps have empathy and compassion for those people suffering in our world. Van Gogh in his great work reflects that death is faced by us all (Ash Wednesday) but the images of the sunflowers and the sun over the wheatfields point to resurrection hope. I hope that you some of you will join us at Woodstock, the house of Mike and Jan, to discover alongside me the artist who loved God, nature, the ordinary person and peasant and a deep desire to comfort others.

May you be blessed by God's love this Lent, Holy Week and Easter,

COLLECT

Almighty God, you show to those who are in error the light of your truth, that they may return to the way of righteousness: grant to all those who are admitted into the fellowship of Christ's religion, that they may reject those things that are contrary to their profession, and follow all such things as are agreeable to the same; through our Lord Jesus Christ, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit one God, now and for ever. Amen.

O T READING: Genesis 15: 1 1- 12 & 17 - 19

The word of the LORD came to Abram in a vision, 'Do not be afraid, Abram, I am your shield; your reward shall be very great.' But Abram said, 'O Lord GOD, what will you give me, for I continue childless, and the heir of my house is Eliezer of Damascus?' And Abram said, 'You have given me no offspring, and so a slave born in my house is to be my heir.' But the word of the LORD came to him, 'This man shall not be your heir; no one but your very own issue shall be your heir.' He brought him outside and said, 'Look towards heaven and count the stars, if you are able to count them.' Then he said to him, 'So shall your descendants be.' And he believed the LORD; and the LORD reckoned it to him as righteousness. Then he said to him, 'I am the LORD who brought you

from Ur of the Chaldeans, to give you this land to possess.’ But he said, ‘O Lord GOD, how am I to know that I shall possess it?’ He said to him, ‘Bring me a heifer three years old, a female goat three years old, a ram three years old, a turtle-dove, and a young pigeon.’ He brought him all these and cut them in two, laying each half over against the other; but he did not cut the birds in two. And when birds of prey came down on the carcasses, Abram drove them away. As the sun was going down, a deep sleep fell upon Abram, and a deep and terrifying darkness descended upon him. When the sun had gone down and it was dark, a smoking fire-pot and a flaming torch passed between these pieces. On that day the LORD made a covenant with Abram, saying, ‘To your descendants I give this land, from the river of Egypt to the great river, the river Euphrates.’

GOSPEL: Luke 13:31- 35

At that very hour some Pharisees came and said to him, ‘Get away from here, for Herod wants to kill you.’ He said to them, ‘Go and tell that fox for me, “Listen, I am casting out demons and performing cures today and tomorrow, and on the third day I finish my work. Yet today, tomorrow, and the next day I must be on my way, because it is impossible for a prophet to be killed away from Jerusalem.” Jerusalem, Jerusalem, the city that kills the prophets and stones those who are sent to it! How often have I desired to gather your children together as a hen gathers her brood under her wings, and you were not willing! See, your house is left to you. And I tell you, you will not see me until the time comes when you say, “Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord.”’

WORSHIP FOR SUNDAY 23 MARCH THE THIRD SUNDAY OF LENT COLLECT

Almighty God, whose most dear Son went not up to joy but first he suffered pain, and entered not into glory before he was crucified: mercifully grant that we, walking in the way of the cross, may find it none other than the way of life and peace; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit one God, now and for ever. Amen.

O T READING: Isaiah 55: 1 -9

The LORD says this: Everyone who thirsts, come to the waters; and you that have no money, come, buy and eat! Come, buy wine and milk without money and without price. Why do you spend your money for that which is not bread, and your labour for that which does not satisfy? Listen carefully to me, and eat what is good, and delight yourselves in rich food. Incline your ear, and come to me; listen, so that you may live.

I will make with you an everlasting covenant, my steadfast, sure love for David. See, I made him a witness to the peoples, a leader and commander for the peoples. See, you shall call nations that you do not know, and nations that do not know you shall run to you, because of the LORD your God, the Holy One of Israel, for he has glorified you. Seek the LORD while he may be found, call upon him while he is near; let the wicked forsake their way, and the unrighteous their thoughts; let them return to the LORD, that he may have mercy on them, and to our God, for he will abundantly pardon. For my thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways my ways, says the LORD. For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts.

GOSPEL: Luke 13: 1— 9

There were some present who told Jesus about the Galileans whose blood Pilate had mingled with their sacrifices. He asked them ‘Do you think that because these Galileans suffered in this way they were worse sinners than all other Galileans? No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all perish as they did. Or those

eighteen who were killed when the tower of Siloam fell on them do you think that they were worse offenders than all the others living in Jerusalem? No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all perish just as they did.’ Then he told this parable: ‘A man had a fig tree planted in his vineyard; and he came looking for fruit on it and found none. So he said to the gardener, “See here! For three years I have come looking for fruit on this fig tree, and still I find none. Cut it down! Why should it be wasting the soil?” He replied, “Sir, let it alone for one more year, until I dig around it and put manure on it. If it bears fruit next year, well and good; but if not, you can cut it down.”’
